<p><b>Game of Thrones / George R R Martin</b>          A fantasy epic spanning generation of warring families, factions and political intrigue.</p>	



**On the Road / Jack Kerouac**





Sherlock Holmes investigates the killing in the remote Dartmoor Wilderness






**Fahrenheit 451 / Ray Bradbury**  
A book burner in a future fascist state finds out books are a vital part of a culture he never knew. He clandestinely pursues reading, until he is betrayed.




**Thirteen Minutes / Sarah Pinborough**


**The Girl of Ink and Stars / Kiran Millwood Hargrave**

As he grows more uncertain of his fate, his personal life - including work at a bank and his relations with his landlady and a young woman who lives next door - becomes increasingly unpredictable. As K. tries to gain control, he succeeds only in accelerating his own excruciating downward spiral.





**The List / Siobhan Vivian**




**Never Let me Go / Kazuo Ishiguro**


**The Water Dancer / Ta-Nehisi Coates**

**Wranglestone / Darren Charlton**

In a post-apocalyptic America, a community survives in a national park, surrounded by water that keeps the Dead at bay. But when winter comes, there's nothing to stop them from crossing the ice. Then homebody Peter puts the camp in danger by naively allowing a stranger to come ashore and he's forced to leave the community of Wranglestone. Now he must help rancher Cooper herd the Dead from their shores before the lake freezes over. But as love blossoms, a dark discovery reveals the sanctuary's secret past. One that forces the pair to question everything they've ever known.




**Station Eleven / Emily St John Mandel**


**The Graveyard Book / Neil Gaiman**


**Oliver Twist / Charles Dickens**


**Silas Marner / George Eliot**


**Pride and Prejudice / Jane Austen**


**East of Eden / John Steinbeck**


**The Lovely Bones / Alice Sebold**
