Dear all,

Our community has enjoyed a slightly different pace this week as a result of our first 'Free Week'. It is clear that students have appreciated a reprieve in relation to homework and I hope that this break will enable a renewal of energy in the coming weeks. We look forward to evaluating the impact of this format, to enable us to plan for the future.

Students and staff have managed incredibly well with the continuation of robust risk management within school to manage COVID19. Unfortunately, we continue to see high cases within our student body. As a result, we will continue with face masks being worn in classrooms and communal areas until the end of this Half Term, Friday 11th February. Enrichment is such a special part of our curriculum and the pride of students in receiving their awards was palpable. We so look forward to the upcoming Enrichment Fairs that will see students choosing their next courses, with hockey coming to the Archer for the first time and a large rock-climbing project to name but a few. On Thursday we took part in an online Whole School Assembly to mark Holocaust Memorial Day. We focused on the central theme of 'One Day'. We explored the stories of those now known as the 'last witnesses', those with important stories to tell and share with us so that we can truly learn from the lessons of the past. We focused on the story of Manfred Goldberg who has taken part in a stunning portrait project with the Royal Collection. These portraits will stand as a powerful testament to the extraordinary resilience and courage of those who survived. I share now the words of Manfred, as I shared with students on Thursday, to support us in ensuring that our community takes every step to always stand up to what is wrong and act with humility and kindness; *'Never overlook injustice. All it takes for evil to triumph is for good people to stay silent. That is often the message that I ask people to inscribe into their hearts.'*

LIVING IN THE DIGITAL AGE – Mrs Mahoney

Following a successful in school presentation to parents with children in year 7 last term, we are delighted that Sophia Davison, a Child and Adolescent Psychotherapist, is offering the same talk online to parents and carers with children in years 7-9. Join her for an online presentation which considers some of the issues our children face living in the digital age.

During the talk Sophia will share her thoughts about setting and keeping boundaries around screen use and will encourage you to think about how to support your children when it comes to acquiring social media skills. Additionally, she will help you better understand, from a developmental perspective why teenagers behave as they do when it comes to their devices and she will share her experiences of the downsides to adolescent wellbeing that she feels have been compounded by our reliance on digital devices. Finally, she will speak about some of the most troubling aspects of digital technology in order

that you feel more confident to help your child navigate life in the digital age and so better support their emotional wellbeing.

Please note that later in the school year Sophia will be giving a different presentation to parents and carers with children in years 10 and 11 which will address some of the issues which are of greater relevance to these age groups.

STRETCH AND CHALLENGE YOUR CHILD – Miss Devi

Following feedback from a parent survey I wanted to share a few simple strategies to support your child's learning and challenge them to do a little more thinking at home.

Strategy 1: Ask your child about what they have learnt at school

This may sound simple, but it supports students in reflecting on their day, consolidating their learning, and reviewing and revising core aspects of the lessons of their busy day.

Strategy 2: Let them teach and lead

Students are learning a whole range of subjects at school and are becoming quite the expert. Empower them with ownership of this by allowing them to teach you, this could be by telling you a narrative about a particular historical period or showing you how to work out a difficult equation. This is also a great way for them to demonstrate leadership and independence.

Strategy 3: Current affairs

Engage students in the news, this could be just watching the news in the evening or reading an article. Do discuss what is happening and perhaps ask their opinion. This supports them in engaging with new and unfamiliar content as well as the process of shaping opinions and ideas. Current affairs also link to many concepts and thinking skills needed for a range of subjects at school and beyond.


UK MATHS TRUST COMPETITION – Miss McDonagh

65 students across Year 7 and 8 were invited to represent Archer Academy in the United Kingdom Mathematics Trust 25th Anniversary Challenge 2022. The UKMT Individual Maths Challenges are lively, intriguing multiple choice question papers, which are designed to stimulate interest in maths in large numbers of students.

This is a prestigious and exciting opportunity, which is recognised by over 4,000 schools and colleges so would be perfect for any college application form. The paper contained 25 multiple choice questions, selected from the past 25 years of JMC papers. The maths team were super impressed with the turn out and the enthusiasm shown by these students.





Super Saturday Archer Accelerate

This week marks **Holocaust Memorial Day**. To commemorate the day and better understand, try one of these affecting reads from the Lower School Library:




New Graphic Novels in the Lower School Library:

In assembly this week I discussed how being prepared can really serve to ease any undue stress and anxiety. I am also interested in your child building skills of preparation and organisation, and not just talking about it. I do not feel we do that best by 'spoon feeding' - I am sure you'll agree.
