# **HOW TO HAVE DIFFICULT CONVERSATIONS – Sophia Davison** Wednesday 8<sup>th</sup> November, 6.15-7.30pm



Our excellent child and adolescent psychotherapist Sophia Davison will be running a session on **Wednesday 8<sup>th</sup> November** from 6.15-7.30pm at lower school entitled '**How to have difficult conversations with your teen**'. This is open to all parents throughout the school and will address some of the topics parents and adolescents describe as being difficult to talk about with one another. Sophia will also share practical techniques, many of which she uses in clinical practice, which can help to start and sustain meaningful conversations.
